This quote resonated with me when I came across it the day after a board meeting. At that meeting, we voted to allocate \$21,000 for staff grants that will be made available to PBL's K-12 teachers.

How many times have you had a great idea you hoped you could put into action? Your only hurdle to implementation was funding. PBL educators have great ideas, and thanks to supporters like you, we can help them put these ideas into action!

Staff grants are just one of several academic initiatives your continued support of The PBL Education Foundation will be funding this year. We will also provide K-8 students with a coupon to purchase a book at each of 2 bookfairs held at their school.

A strong school system is needed to attract and retain a solid employment base, to aid in successful economic development, and to prepare our students to become future community leaders. Significant change occurred this year as our high school principal, Hannah Eshleman, and I both took on new leadership roles within the district. Throughout the year we continued to "just get back to school," which three short years ago seemed like would never get to that point. Following two consecutive years of "normalcy" I feel we can safely say we are there.

Throughout the 2023-2024 school year many positives occurred that helped to move our district forward. Our first group of teachers "graduated" from the PBL Navigators teacher mentoring & induction program. Since its inception two years ago, this program has been instrumental in helping new staff members become a part of our school community and grow as professionals. Additionally, early in the year it became clear that new ELA curriculum materials were needed to ensure cohesive and aligned English Language Arts instruction. Led by Assistant Superintendent Tara Chandler, our teachers worked together to review, research, and select new ELA curriculum materials that will be implemented throughout the district starting with the 2024-2025 school year. The work and teamwork I observed from our staff as they quickly worked through this difficult process was inspiring. Lastly, I want to highlight that based on U.S. News & World Report scoring, PBL High School was listed as a top 10 high school in central Illinois. Congratulations to the high school students and staff on this achievement!

In closing, I want to say how proud I am to be a PBL Panther! As I begin my 23rd year in the district and 2nd year as superintendent, I have grown to understand and appreciate just how much our community supports me, the school district, our staff, and our students. Certainly a part of this support comes from the PBL Education Foundation, whose continuous support allows us to provide unique resources and educational opportunities for our students. As we enter the 2024-2025 school year, I look forward to continuing this partnership.

Project Lead the Way

During the 4th quarter, eighth grade students took a Project Lead The Way course called Medical Detectives with Mr. Daron Johnson. In the 9-week course, students played the role of real-life medical detectives as they collected and analyzed medical data to diagnose disease. They also solved medical mysteries through hands-on projects and labs, measured and interpreted vital signs, examined nervous system structure and function, and investigated disease outbreaks.







Planting Seeds! Staff Grants Funded by Your Gifts

During the 2023-2024 school year, \$15,000 in staff grants was awarded to the Clara Petersen Elementary School, grades K-5. Your gifts help staff plant seeds in our students' minds.







Colonial Games Grant - Fourth grade students played seven different colonial games to enhance their study on the early settlements up to the Revolutionary War. Angela Dirks, 4th grade ELA teacher stated, "They LOVED IT! We had the Olympics music playing in the background as they rotated through the different games (stations)."





The PBL Education Foundation wishes to thank all the donors who support our annual fundraising campaign, allowing us to support programs and equipment that have a profound impact on PBL students' lives.

Transformation Grant - "Students with special needs require alternative ways of learning. When provided with engaging lessons, students' interest increases. When a student is actively engaged, they comprehend material at a much higher rate," Special Education teacher Andi Staton commented. The transformations the teachers provided were: operating room, pizza shop, glow party, detectives, racing, construction, and carnival themes.









Kindergarten Classroom Improvements - Five classroom carpets and one Big Book Display were purchased to enhance the educational setting within each classroom. With the addition of the carpets the kindergarten students are able to dance, do yoga, learn letters through movement, count to 100 with motions, and do countless other activities on the flooring areas. "Our new carpet provides a soft, comfortable space for our students to read alone or with a buddy reader. We are so lucky that the PBL Education Foundation offered a grant to help fund our new learning space!" Anna Talbert, kindergarten teacher.

Orff Instrument Grant - "The addition of new Orff instruments to the music classroom has completely transformed the way our students participate in music. I have seen an increased understanding of pitch, rhythm, and solfege syllables when using the instruments as a tool for learning." - Allyson Miller, Clara Peterson Music Teacher

Climbing Wall Grant - "Indoor wall climbing is one of the fastest-growing curricular and extra-curricular innovations today. It promotes team building, positive risk taking, creative problem solving, and empathy development," said PE Teacher Amy Swan. "Self-confidence, personal trust, and will power are some of the vital skills students will gain from a climbing wall. Our goal for a climbing wall is to reach students who are not engaged by the traditional menu of physical education via sports," added PE Teacher Jake LeClair.


Best-selling author visits PBL Junior High




Carl Hudson, Jr.

Paxton High School, Class of 1960

Carl Hudson Jr. is a member of the Paxton Community High School graduating class of 1960. After graduating high school, Carl went on to complete his Bachelors of Science in Pharmacy from Purdue University in 1965. Carl has since made significant contributions in his career and in the Paxton community. These accomplishments include owning Hudson Drug Shop from 1975 -2007, which became one of the first pharmacies to become computerized in the 1980's. Carl spent several years teaching American Red Cross courses in several Ford County communities and has served on the Board of Directors for the Paxton Community Hospital, before it's closing, and the Gibson Area Hospital Board of Directors, totalling 49 years of service. In addition, Carl has been an elected trustee of the Paxton Area Fire Protection District and has served in this role for thirty-six years. Furthermore, he has made contributions to various community organizations and boards including the Ford County Mental Health Board, Paxton Chamber of Commerce, Founding Member of the PBL School Education Foundation, Cunningham Children's Home Foundation Board, in addition to several others. He was a finalist for the national Next Generation Pharmacist Civic Leader of the Year in 2010 and a recipient of the Bowl of Hygeia Community Service Award

through the Illinois Pharmacists Association in 2010. He also founded and coached the Paxton Swedes, an E.I. League baseball team. Carl Hudson Jr. has significantly impacted the Paxton and surrounding communities through his extensive involvement, investment, leadership, and



innovative ideas.

Paul Meuser is a graduate of the Paxton High School Class of 1972. Paul has held the title of Head Boys Basketball Coach at various high schools in Oklahoma.

Under his leadership, Paul has coached 13 state teams, produced 12 all-state players, and 2 Oklahoma Players of the Year. In addition to these honors, Paul has over 40 years in education, 37 of which as a Head Basketball Coach, and 3 years as an Athletic Director. He has made a positive impact on thousands of students and hundreds of athletes and has come full circle back to his roots at PBL. Paul now lives in Paxton and is married to his childhood sweetheart, the former Cindy Custer.

In 2019 When the PBL Endowment Fund was created. the intent of the Education Foundation Board of Directors was to find a funding mechanism to provide us with a long-term, reliable source of funding for academics in our district. IT IS WORKING!

At the end of 2023, The Foundation received another* \$250,000 anonymous gift pushing the principal fund balance over \$1,000,000! Yes! The plan IS WORKING!

And yet we urge our supporters to help us continue growing the "base" or principal. Why? Because we do

not take money out of the principal to use for academics in our school district. We take the income earned from the principal.** When the principal grows, so does the amount of money we can use for district academics. Growing the PBL Endowment Fund ensures our



school district will have a long-term, reliable source of funding.
